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I moved to Congresbury a year ago and my 2<sup>nd</sup> child is now 9 months. I have found my maternity leave this time quite isolating as there is little to walk to in the village and - although there are three pubs, there's nowhere like a café or 'hub' to meet other similar mums. Mums of school age children meet at the school gate and through their children. Before school age its more difficult. I had my first child in Bristol and the culture to go for a walk and stop for a chat and coffee is constant and the conversations really helps get you out of the house but also help you feel like you're not alone in your struggles with your baby. It's only in the last month that I've managed to find other mums in the village, ironically through getting the message out about the new Village Hall development!

There are a few local mums I have met through a group in Yatton. We've met in Wrington, Clevedon, Chew Stoke and Cleeve but there is nowhere to meet in Congresbury. We met in Poppies in Claverham Village Hall where it was lovely to be able to feed the babies and chat, but also sit alongside other groups and older people.

A coffee morning was held in the Rec Club on 31<sup>st</sup> August and there were so many people there of all ages. I brought one of the mums I mentioned that lives in Langford and it was great to be able to do that! There is the park by the club which older kids can gravitate towards regularly checking in. The cricket pitch is a marvellous all sports area for our toddlers!

There is the opportunity with this application to create something where groups of mums be it of babies, or school age children on the way back from school, can meet to catch up and help each other. There is the opportunity for an intergenerational element which is proven to be beneficial to both groups. Older people don't always get to see their grandchildren, or have them, and it's a delight to be able to have a conversation about my baby with the older people I meet as I can see the pleasure they get from it.

In conclusion, all ages would benefit from having a café in the village and it would be ideal for this to be community run and benefit the village. Personally from my experience I have found the last year difficult without local friends to link with. It's difficult to find that group without the community hub and café element to meet people. I hope this application is accepted so that future mums on maternity leave and with little babbers can find all the support they need.
